

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TREATY TRAIL

The Ho-Chunk Treaty Trail is the focus of this year's online history series which takes the form of a video documentary with six episodes. This experience was marked by a succession of treaty-mandated reservations where families were forced to relocate, adapt, and carry on their lives in the midst of trauma. The Historic Indian Agency House was established in 1832 at Wawa'aija — the ancient portaging trail which once connected the Fox and Wisconsin rivers. Wawa'aija (pronounced Wau-wau-on-een-jau) opened up a vast superhighway of travel, trade, and cultural interaction. Similarly, the portage has the capacity today to reconnect us with the weighty events of the past, as well as provide a broader perspective on the

The Fox-Wisconsin portage was a key location at which the Ho-Chunk Nation grappled with forced displacement. Although inseparably woven into the fabric of Wisconsin's history, the particulars of this chapter remain largely unexplored. Contrary to years of historical interpretation, Ho-Chunks were not silent during those pivotal years of upheaval and sweeping change. A substantial body of primary sources survive, including transcripts of evocative speeches by Ho-Chunk elders.


This history is the foundation of a new permanent outdoor exhibit slated to open this spring at our trailhead. It is a means by which the voices preserved in the historical record may again speak.

Uniting a historical narrative with the very place at which it occurred is powerful.

While our online video series highlights the "Treaty Trail" of Ho-Chunk families who were pushed hundreds of miles beyond their homeland, this exhibit expands on the experiences of those who remained in or returned to Wisconsin during the era of forced displacement. These families lived as fugitives in their own homeland. An online enhancement to the exhibit will allow visitors to go further in-depth.

"Walking Wawa'ajja" is produced by the Historic Indian Agency House in collaboration with the Ho-Chunk Nation Museum & Cultural Center, and is funded in part by the Chipstone Foundation; the Kohler Foundation; the Edward C. Lenz and June M. Lenz Charitable Trust; and Wisconsin Humanities, with funds from the National Endowment for the Humanities and the State of Wisconsin.*

PRESERVING THE PAST


